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

H8CHC Exhibits Honor World War I Centennial

The Great War: Arkansas in World War I, a traveling exhibit from the Arkansas State Archives, an agency of the Department of Arkansas Heritage was exhibited at the HSCHS May 9-16. It told the story of Arkansas' role during World War I at home and on the battlefields. The traveling exhibit consisted of 12 panels that showcased images from the Arkansas State Archives' holdings, including original documents, photographs, posters, maps and historical objects, giving a first-hand look at the lives of Arkansans during the war.

In addition to the traveling exhibit, there were displays on Hot Spring County during WWI. County topics included; THOSE WHO SERVED, THOSE WHO DID NOT RETURN, HOT SPRING COUNTY – THE HOME FRONT, HOT SPRING COUNTY WWI TIMELINE, THE SPANISH FLU, AND LETTERS HOME FROM SOLDIERS. The Hot Spring County information represented new research regarding the great war and was compiled by Pat and Danna Carver. Approximately 200 people viewed the exhibit. H8CH8 H08T8 EXHIBIT ON AFRICAN AMERICAN LEGISLATOR8

Arkansas African American Legislators, 1868-1893, a traveling exhibit produced by the Arkansas State Archives and Black History Commission of Arkansas, was displayed at The HSCHS April 4-16. The exhibit told of the 85 African Americans who served in the Arkansas General Assembly in the 19th century. After the Civil War, Arkansas adopted a new constitution in 1868 and its provisions included the right to vote and hold public office for black males. African American lawyers, merchants, ministers, educators, farmers, and other professionals served in the Arkansas General Assembly. Photographs of 46 of the legislators were part of the display. H8CH8 Meeting Highlights

HSCHS member Tom Dillard presented a history of Tulip Arkansas to a capacity audience at the March 6 meeting. The first settler in Tulip, originally known as Brownsville, was Moses Overton who arrived there in 1828. A post office was established in Tulip in 1845 and Col. Maurice Smith was appointed as postmaster. Col. Smith had served in the Tennessee State Senate before moving to Tulip.

Benjamin Borden, a for-

mer owner of the Arkan-

sas Gazette, also resided

in Tulip. Tulip flourished for about 20 years, becoming a center of education for a few years, but declined during and after the Civil War. In 1849, 24 year old George Alexander, a graduate of Washington University arrived in Tulip and started the Arkansas Military Institute and the Tulip Female Collegiate Seminary within a year. Students at the Military Institute were instructed by West Point graduate Thomas Bur-

Mr. Dillard read excerpts from the book Tulip Evermore, a collection of hundreds of letters by Tulip residents Emma Butler and William Paisley written between the years 1857 to 1887. William Paisley kept a store at Tulip and another near Okolona. A number of

Tulip residents migrated to Malvern after the arrival of the railroad in the early 1870s.

April 2017

Arkansas author Elizabeth Griffin Hill spoke to the Society at the April 3 meeting about her new book Faithful to Our Tasks. The book details experiences of women in Arkansas during WWI. Due to the number of men inducted for the war, women worked at jobs normally performed by men. Local women in Red Cross workrooms sewed 42 items for each soldier in Europe and made surgical dressings. In August they began to knitt items for soldiers to wear during the winter months. Individual women's groups, including the General Federation of Women's Clubs, stepped in to meet unmet needs of the Red Cross. The severe nursing shortage at home and abroad led to a student nurse drive in 1918 for both the U.S. Student **Nurse Reserve and the** Army School of Nursing. Women were asked to register for whatever service they might give to the war effort and for food conservation. Food shortages and conservation were critical. Wheat, meat, and sugar were rationed. Women were asked to pledge to use substitutes for these commodities in their homes.

The Malvern-Hot Spring County Library offers a variety of programs and services for all ages. Our collections include:

 and Arkansas history collections and access to 23 computers is available to the public.
